The first part deals with the cemeteries of Stará Kouřim „U Libuše“ in Bohemia, Pohansko "Herrenhof" in Moravia and Thunau "Obere Holzweise" in Northern Austria. They are all situated in regions that are dominated by Slavonic populations but strongly influenced by the Carolingian Empire especially regarding the ways of personal representation. All of them comprise several hundred burials with hundreds of grave goods and they have been published in form of printed books. In the first part of the presentation a short overview about the archaeological remains will be given, focusing mainly on the site of Thunau.

Last but not least it will be discussed in which way the information can be disseminated and digitally distributed to allow for a sustainable further usage.
